Township Acquires Property for Parks & Open Space

Brighton Township has purchased 37.7 acres of property from the Perry family. The purchase price was \$37,712. The acquisition provides for the preservation of open space and environmentally sensitive acreage, while also providing the township with an opportunity for the development and construction of trails and a green corridor along Two Mile Run Creek, which includes a large wetland and floodplain areas. The property purchase expands an existing township recreation area, Two Mile Run Extension Park, which is accessed from Brighton Road. The existing park has a paved walking trail and disc golf course, and is immediately adjacent to the Township Municipal Complex and Public Works site. The township has identified an additional property for future acquisition that would provide a final link to Two Mile Run Park on Gypsy Glen Road.

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

Once again, the Brighton Township Historical Society is requesting residents of the Brighton Township area to consider donating artifacts to our organization. A primary function of history organizations is the acquisition, display and safe keeping of community heirlooms. Entrusted items are then safely and securely passed on to future generations. However, this mission can only be accomplished with help from the local populace. We are interested in old photos, letters, writings, books and news articles depicting life and events of bygone Brighton Township. Let's not forget, we are definitely looking for items pertaining to the one room schools of the early Township.

Winter Road Maintenance Preparations Underway

The Township is preparing for the snow removal season and has contracts in place for the purchase of road salt and cinders for the treatment of roads. The Township's 2012 budget includes over \$192,000 for the purchase of road salt, cinders and related materials to maintain the roads during winter conditions. To reduce material costs, anti-skid material is mixed with salt for certain road treatments, and salt brine application equipment has been placed on the trucks to make the melting process more efficient, reducing the amount of material necessary.

Help us with the maintenance of the roads this winter by following these winter reminders:

- Remove vehicles from the street during any snow event that requires plowing or the application of salt or cinders. There is reduced visibility for the drivers during snow or at night. Having to maneuver through parked traffic does make their jobs much more difficult.
- Township Ordinance regarding snow removal does prohibit parking, or allowing to be parked, any motor vehicle or other vehicle on any public street within the Township following the deposit or accumulation of ice or snow of three (3) inches or greater in depth, until the snow has been completely plowed from the full width of the roadway. Violators are subject to a \$15 fine when ticketed by the Police Department, or towing when necessary.
- Do not shovel snow into the road or have your driveway plowed into the road. This creates a safety hazard. If possible, wait until the road has been plowed before cleaning out the end of your driveway. There is no practical way to plow the road without depositing snow into your driveway. Township snow removal crews do not clear private driveways or driveway entrances of accumulated snow.
- Cul-de-sacs are difficult to clear to everyone's satisfaction. Snowplows do not have the ability to lift and carry snow from one area to another. The plow pushes the snow. The driver pushes the snow to an area most suitable to expedite the plowing and to open the road for the majority of residents. The Road Department will return to cul-de-sac areas for more thorough clearing after all roads have been properly plowed and treated.
- Mailboxes and posts are often broken from the weight of the plowed snow or simply pushed over by snow. Please check posts for deterioration to reduce the possibility of breakage. Also, install mailboxes as far from the edge of the roadway as permitted by your postal delivery personnel. Installations in the right of way are placed there at the owner's risk.
- Do not drive unnecessarily in a storm, especially during severe snowstorms and freezing rains. If you do drive, be sure to properly clean your windshield and to have winter wiper blades. Verify that your tires are properly inflated and have sufficient tread.



State Road Maintenance

PA D.O.T. provides winter maintenance on the following: Interstate 376, Tuscarawas Road, Barclay Hill Road, Lisbon Road, Pine Grove Road (from Doyle Drive to Industry), Wildwood Road, Grange Road, Park Road, Brady's Run Road, Achortown Road, and Doyle Drive. Concerns regarding any of these roads should be directed to PA D.O.T. at (724) 774-6610 (answers 24 hours).

Township Restates Burning Regulations

At their July 9th meeting, the Brighton Township Supervisors adopted an ordinance to revise and restate the regulations for Outdoor Burning. The regulations have been written in a format that make their enforcement before a judicial magistrate easier by creating two sections that independently specify permitted activities and prohibited activities.

The Township's solid waste management program includes the unlimited collection of household refuse, curbside recycling and a yard waste drop-off and composting site. With mandatory participation required in the refuse and recycling collection program, the need to burn household-generated refuse has been significantly reduced. However, outdoor burning of paper and other refuse material that is readily combustible and will not create nauseous fumes, noxious smoke or excessive fly ash does remain available on Wednesday through Saturday from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M. subject to the following:

- Outdoor burning is prohibited on holidays.
- Burning is to occur within a salamander, wire basket or masonry enclosure with openings not greater in size than ½ inch. The receptacle must be equipped with a top.
- No outside fire shall be kindled or maintained within ten (10) feet of any property line or any building on the subject property, nor within fifty (50) feet of any building on any adjoining property.
- All fires must be tended at all times until the fire is totally extinguished. It shall be unlawful to leave a smoldering fire unattended.
- The burning of items designated to be recycled is expressly prohibited.
- The burning of garbage, vegetable waste, rubber, plastics, furniture, glass, metals, crocking, car products or any other materials which will create nauseous or noxious fumes, smoke, toxic chemicals or excessive fly ash is specifically prohibited.
- The burning of dry grass and garden waste is specifically prohibited on all lots of ten (10) acres or less. The burning of leaves is prohibited, regardless of the size of the property.

Charcoal or wood fires kindled for the purpose of outside barbecues shall be permitted and shall be considered recreational fires exempt from the burning day restrictions. Such fires shall be contained within a defined burning ring not to exceed 60 inches in diameter. Such fires shall be permitted from 7:00 a.m. to 11:30 p.m.

A person engaged in the business or occupation of farming is exempt from the restrictions.

Beaver County Hosts Household Chemical Collection

The Beaver County Recycling Center, located in Bradys Run Park, is hosting a Household Chemical Collection on Saturday, October 13, 2012 from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The fee for collection is \$2/gallon – Cash Only.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, an average home can easily accumulate as much as 100 lbs of cleaners, pesticides, paints, automotive fluids and other products containing hazardous components. If you or someone you know can't use them, or if they are simply outdated or no longer needed, you can dispose of them properly at this collection.

Acceptable items include aerosol cans, automotive fluids, batteries, chemistry sets, compact fluorescent bulbs, gasoline and kerosene, household cleaners, mercury, paint products (including sealers, thinners and strippers), pesticides/herbicides and other chemicals.

The following is a partial list of what is not accepted: ammunition, appliances, bulk waste, drugs, explosives, fluorescent tubes, tires, explosives, medical waste and other non-listed items.

Dawson Ridge Park Improvements

Several improvements have been completed this summer or are underway at the Dawson Ridge Park. New fencing and foul poles were provided for Dawson Field. A new electrical service was installed for the park, along with new lighting for the basketball court, T-Ball field and batting cage. All light standards were sanded, primed and painted as well. New fence fabric is scheduled to be provided for the basketball court and the existing post and rails are to be painted. These improvements are a welcomed addition to the park, which sees so much activity throughout the year.

Heritage Foundation Launches Capital Campaign to Preserve and Repurpose Beaver Station

The Beaver Area Heritage Foundation is launching a \$2.3 million capital campaign to restore and repurpose Beaver's historic 1897 train station. This 8,500 square foot National Historic District treasure will soon be transformed into Beaver Station – A Multi-Use Cultural and Event Center. The lower level and 911 center "bunker" will house the Beaver County Genealogical & History Center, a new archival and research area for the adjacent Beaver Area Heritage Museum and classrooms for Sweetwater Center for the Arts and others. The elegant upper level and grounds will become an upscale event venue for civic, business and social events including wedding receptions. The Heritage Foundation will be seeking both public and private grants and is pleased to report Beaver Station has already received the maximum Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission grant of \$25,000, a highly credible endorsement of this important project. However the majority of our funding must come from private donations. We hope civic minded folks will see this as a unique and exciting opportunity to enhance our community for many years to come. The Vision for Preserving Beaver Station as a County-wide, Multi-Use Cultural and Community Jewel

Our Vision: The Borough of Beaver, Pennsylvania, has asked the Beaver Area Heritage Foundation (BAHF) to take a lead role in a restoration and preservation plan for the former Pittsburgh & Lake Erie Railroad (P&LE) passenger station to keep this architecturally significant building within our control as a jewel of the community.

We have developed an initiative that will return the station to its original, beautiful external appearance and create an attractively landscaped campus along East End Avenue, in Beaver. Since this initiative must be financially self-sustaining, we are partnering with two groups: Sewickley's popular Sweetwater Center for the Arts, who wish to establish a branch campus, and the Beaver County Genealogical and History Center. For our own heritage museum, which has grown so quickly that we are entirely out of space, we also seek an enlarged archives and research facility for our permanent collections.

Brighton Township will continue this fall with the curbside collection program for leaf waste to comply with and implement State regulations that mandate curbside recycling, including yard waste. Please note that the yard waste drop-off site will continue to operate on the same basis as it currently is and, therefore, participation in the curbside collection program is optional. With 75 miles of roads, curbside collection of leaves and other yard waste is a significant undertaking for the Township, and is costly in terms of labor and equipment operation. It is hoped that many homeowners will continue to use the drop-off site, or compost the leaves in their own yards.

The collection of leaves and yard waste has been established as a fee-based program whereby residents purchase biodegradable paper collection bags at a cost of \$2.00 each within which the leaves, garden residues, shrubbery clippings or tree trimmings must be placed. Bags must be placed at the curb on collection days to be designated. Bags will be pre-sold at the Municipal Building and must be purchased from the Township, not from another source, such as a home improvement store. Watch for newspaper announcements of the collection dates and when the leaf bags will be available for purchase.

**Water Service During Vacation and
Winter Get Away**

Going away for an extended period of time? The Brighton Township Municipal Authority offers a service to have your water service terminated at the curb stop for persons whose home may be vacant for an extended period of time. A service fee of \$10 is charged for both the turn-off and turn-on; a total of \$20. No charges accrue to your account during the period of termination. Accounts turned off prior to the 15th of the month will receive a ½ month's charge, and after the 15th will receive a full month's charge. A person must be present within the home when the service is turned back on. You will need to call the Authority Office to schedule an appointment for this service.

Another option is that you can shut off the Stop and Waste Valve which is near the water meter in your home. If the home is vacant for an extended period this will help prevent significant flooding within the home should there be a plumbing failure while the home is vacant. However, unless service is terminated at the curb, monthly billings and charges will continue to accrue during the vacancy.

Is your roof flushing raw sewage into our rivers?

Whenever it rains, water flows off hundreds of thousands of roofs, into downspouts and down our storm drains. If our downspouts are connected to the underground sewer lines, storm water can overload the lines. Causing sewage to overflow into our rivers —the source of the water we use everyday.

Fortunately, there's a solution. Many dedicated people and municipalities are working on it.

You can help too. Check with your local community about whether you need to disconnect



your downspouts from the sewer system.

Connect a rain barrel to your home's downspout so the water can be captured, conserved and used later on your yard or garden. Plant trees and other vegetation to reduce storm water runoff from your yard.

Emergency Notification System Established

As previously reported, the Municipal Authority uses the services of Swiftreach Networks, Inc. as its emergency notification provider to comply with PA DEP Public Notification Rules. The Swift911™ system is designed to make phone calls on a Township-wide basis, or to specific people or areas, in the event of an emergency, and can make hundreds of calls a minute to convey recorded messages. It can also be used to share important information. The system is also available for use by emergency services or other Township Departments who can give notice of water service disruptions, road closures, missing persons or other information.

Residents Asked to Update Contact Information

The Swift911™ system is the primary method utilized by the Authority to notify residents of scheduled service disruptions for water system repairs and/or upgrades. If current contact information is not available, prior notification will not be received.

The Swiftreach Network data was provided by a third party data provider and only included listed phone numbers. It is important for residents and business owners to verify the accuracy of the information provided to us, and to provide additional contact information such as unlisted, unpublished or cell phone numbers and even email addresses. Accurate information in the database helps to ensure emergency notifications will be passed on to everyone in a timely manner.

You may also remove yourself from the list. If you do not have access to a computer you may call 724-774-4800 to provide Emergency Notification Information: Name, Address, Primary Phone and Alternate/Cell Phone. Please be assured that this information will not be provided to any outside agencies or companies.

As everyone is aware, the Veteran's Memorial Bridge is currently under construction to span the Beaver River at the northern end of Bridgewater and the southern end of New Brighton. But, you may not be aware that there is a Beaver County Veteran's Memorial Bridge Committee raising funds for the purpose of constructing a Veteran's Memorial to honor all veterans. Their sponsoring organization is the Viet Nam Veterans of Beaver County.

The memorial will be constructed in the quadrant closest to Bridgewater. Funds are being raised through direct donations, and the selling of T-shirts, engraved bricks and paper bricks. Billing Procedures for Water & Sewer Service

The Brighton Township Municipal Authority and Sewage Authority bill jointly for water and sewer services. Bills are sent monthly to each account. The monthly charge for the typical residential account is \$23.90 for water and \$30.00 for sewer. The Township is divided into three billing districts, and each month one district has a water meter reading. Therefore, each meter is read once every quarter (each three months) or four times per year. Any use over 12,000 gallons is classified as excess usage and is billed at a rate of \$4.95 per 1,000 gallons of excess water and \$7.50 per 1,000 gallons of excess sewage.

The bill shows a gross amount and a net amount. The net amount is the amount billed and due on the date shown. The gross amount is the amount due if payment is made after the due date, and includes a 10% penalty for late payment. Payment can be made with a single check made payable to "BTMA/BTSA":

- By mail;
- At the Municipal Building, 1300 Brighton Road, between 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday; or
- Through the payment drop after hours and on weekends or holidays.

Please enclose the payment stub with your payment. Refer to the rear of the billing card for Service Code identification.

Online Credit Card Payments

The Municipal & Sewage Authorities have added online payment capability to their utility billing operations. More information on this service is available on the Brighton Township web site www.brightontwp.org on the Water & Sewage Authorities Page in the Resident's Center.

Automatic Bill Payment

Your water and sewage billings through the Brighton Township Municipal Authority (BTMA) and Brighton Township Sewage Authority (BTSA) can be automatically drawn from your checking account. Join hundreds of your neighbors who have elected to register for the Automatic Bill Payment service. Important Billing Notice

Each account is invoiced monthly and bill cards should be received around the 1st of each month. If you do not receive your bill card, please contact the Municipal Building to inquire about your account. Payment of the monthly billing is required by the due date to avoid penalty. Lost or misplaced bill cards are not the responsibility of the Authority.

Recycling is Easy!

HOW TO PREPARE YOUR MATERIALS

Glass - Clear, Brown and Green Bottles and Jars

1. Rinse - remove styrofoam labels.
2. Remove metal lids and rings.
3. Place in green recycling container.
4. Do not break glass.
5. Do not include auto glass, light bulbs, porcelain, ceramic, plate glass or crystal.



Aluminum, Bi-Metal & Tin Food and Beverage Containers and Aluminum Foil

1. Rinse thoroughly, crush cans.
2. Place in green recycling container.



Plastic Bottles and Jugs Only

1. Rinse thoroughly, remove caps.
2. Flatten to save space.
3. Containers must have the three arrow recycling logo, with the numbers 1 or 2 inside it.
4. Containers that originally held motor oil, antifreeze, or other chemicals are not recyclable.
5. Place in green recycling container.
6. Do not include plastic bags or buckets.



Newspapers and Magazines

1. Fold newspapers once and slide into paper bag along with magazines.
2. Do not tie newspapers, magazines or paper bag
3. Do not use plastic bags under any circumstances.
4. No cardboard, cereal, cracker or pizza boxes.
5. Place next to or in recycling container at roadside.



- Place your recycling container at roadside on the same day as your regular garbage collection during the recycling weeks.
- Do not place items in separate bags or they will not be collected. Place recyclables directly into recycling container.

- Recover your recycling container promptly after collection.

NOTE: The recycling container remains the property of Brighton Township and must remain at the residence if you move. Your recycling container is to be used for recycling only.
